LOVE IS STRONG AS DEATH!

In this biblical record of the history of Joseph (Genesis Chapters 39-46) you can find the three secrets of a successful Christian message. Joseph, from being sold as a slave, from being in a prison, became the prime minister of Egypt. How did this happen? Why this exceptional blessing over Egypt? Why should it have great plenty and be warned of famine in meager years to follow?

1. The Pharaoh of that time was every inch a king. He acted as a king not only when awake. His subconscious was also filled with concern for the welfare of his people and he would dream about it at night. Every Christian is a king. Luther said "A Christian is a perfectly free lord of all, subject to none." But a Christian is a loving king. Therefore, Luther adds, "A Christian is a servant of all, subject to all."

A Christian does not have to strive to be a soul-winner; it is no imposition to him to place the well-being of the church first. His Christian belief has pervaded his subconscious. He simply is a soul-winner, a man who puts God's Kingdom first. When he falls asleep, when the power of will disappears, the extension of God's Kingdom will be his dream. In my life, my dream from the first day of my conversion, has been to witness Christ to the Russians. Such dreams are always fulfilled.

2. Pharaoh, the dreamer of good, meets another dreamer of dreams, Joseph, and unites with him. When I came to the West after many years of dreaming in Communist prisons about reaching the Communist world with the Word of God, I met Western pastors and believers who had had the same dream but did not know how to fulfill it. We could unite.

3. Pharaoh was completely unprejudiced. He was advised to call to his court a foreigner with another color of skin, a man who worshipped only one unseen God, even a prisoner with a very bad reputation. The charge for which Joseph had been jailed, was assault on a woman with the intention to rape. Yet, who knew if the charges against Joseph were true? Slaveholders in Egypt often jailed their slaves without a fair trial.

For this Pharaoh, every man could be used for the welfare of the country. Men who had committed very bad deeds yesterday, could have become good men this morning. The fulfilling of these conditions gave Egypt a great plenty and provision for themselves and their neighbors in times of famine.

We, also, have not the slightest prejudice. Saint Paul had been a torturer of Christians. A torturer if repentant, can be a future apostle. We just love him and try to win him for Christ.

Is somebody a traitor of the Underground Church, or a church leader who compromises with Communism in the West? We don't wonder. The heart of every man is easily deceived. We love him and try to win him for the right attitude.

Communism wishes to dominate the white, black, yellow nations. But the wise Solomon wrote: "Love is strong as death" (Song of Songs 8:6). Death, and Communism, one of its harbingers wishes men of all races. So wishes Christian love! "God has made all men of one blood" (Acts 17:26) All men, good and bad, of all religions and races "live and move and have their being in Him" (Acts 17:28) The Chinese Communists torture Christians. Then we must make greatest effort preach them the Gospel. Rioting youth in America are destroying university buildings. Let us then preach to them the Gospel. We wish to win for Christ the Communists and those of all races oppressed or led astray by them. We must have inwardly the right attitude of love. The Communist torturers are themselves unhappy. A Communist police officer in Russia broke out in tears while beating a Christian and cried out to him: "You believe yourself a good man and forget about me. You become a martyr and go to heaven but I end up being a murderer. What about me? I beat you and I go to hell." Christian love can create from troubles, opportunities!

Christians Helped with your Gifts 5 Years Communist Sentence for Transporting Bibles!

I, Oliynyk Lydia write as follows: "My husband, Peter Oliynyk was born in 1931. We had 9 children, 2 died. My husband Peter was a member of the (Baptist) church of the city of Lvov, (in present Ukraine, formerly part of the Soviet Union.) At one time, he studied with youthful enthusiasm and zealously participated in the Church work. He preached the Word of God and helped transport (surreptitiously printed) spiritual literature!

Church services were often held in our apartment. In 1980, believers and sisters were tried in the Soviet courts of our city Lvov.

My husband and I also attended the trial. 2 years have passed. My husband was (wrongfully) accused at his trial to have beaten a policeman. At the trial, the policeman openly lied. On February 23, 1982, my husband was convicted to five years of prison for having preached the Word of God. At the same time, they searched our apartment, broke the front door, and confiscated a lot of spiritual literature. After an appeal, his sentenced was reduced by several years so that he served only one year and nine months.

He was condemned for believing in God, for preaching the Word of God. He led an active spiritual life, and was involved in binding the secretly printed literature. It was very difficult for me! But I accepted everything, as from the Lord. He worked diligently in prison and this affected the fact that he was released ahead of schedule. God miraculously maintained my husband even in prison, he was blessed and the prison guards ended up well disposed to him. When he was released though, he could not obtain a job unless he agreed to become an informer for the KGB (the Soviet secret police.) This he refused to do. God miraculously kept us, and I thank the Lord for everything. After the liberalization period named Perestroika (the liberal-reforms introduced at first by the Soviet president Gorbachev, N. Ed.) and the dismemberment of the Soviet Union, Peter participated in the construction of a house of prayer in Lvov. Later, he began to write poetry and translate Christian books.

Bytin Alexander Fedorovich Eight Years of Communist Imprisonment for Christian Youth-Meetings



Bitina Nina Stepanovna, widow*, wrote to us: "Bytin Alexander Fedorovich was born in the Merkulevo village, Bryansk region, Russia, on May 12, 1934. His father Fyodor died, being only 40 years old. Alexander, five, and three siblings remained in the care of their mother, Mary Marthailovna, who devoted her whole life to parenting. Mother became a Christian soon after the death of her husband. Having been baptized, she wholeheartedly loved her Savior and conveyed a living faith in God to her children. Herself and children had to walk 12 miles to attend their church. Alexander, when becoming a young man, expressed much love for the meetings of God's people. After graduating from high school, Alexander, studied in a construction college. He had to be baptized secretly since the Soviet communist authorities would not approve baptisms of persons of his age. He was 19. After graduating from college, he was sent to

Kazakhstan, formerly part of the Soviet Union. Then, he was taken into the army in the city of Konotop, Sumy region (in today's Ukraine, at the time part of the Soviet Union.) After the military service, he returned to Bryansk and became a member of the official Baptist church. In 1959. Alexander Fedorovich married Shchivisenko Nina Stepanovna. God blessed them with 3 sons and 6 daughters. Being much appreciated as an engineer, he found a place of employment in Kursk, where he showed himself as an exceptional specialist in construction engineering. In this new employment position, he was given excellent housing. Yet, the authorities made an unexpected, unpleasant request: He needed write and hand to authorities a statement renouncing his belief in God. Alexander Fedorovich categorically refused. As a result, he was promptly fired.

Returning to Bezhitsa, Bryansk region, he again became a member of the local registered church, a so-called Baptist church controlled totally by the communist government. Even this church though, was closed later on by the communist authorities. Thus, he and his wife joined the underground, unregistered Baptist church. He spoke of himself as follows: 'This is the time of my awakening as a Christian.' On September 8th, 1968 Alexander Fedorovich was ordained to become an elder, a ministry that he performed to the end of his life.

After Alexander Fedorovich led a youth gathering in the city of Orel, just for this Christian event, he was arrested and sentenced to 3 years imprisonment. He served the prison term in the Mordovia region, Russia. When freed he returned home, for only a period of 10 months as in 1972, he was again sentenced for his underground Christian activity to another two-years prison term, this time of a harsher regime. These prison conditions were very difficult for him. He served in the north of the Ural Mountains, beyond Solikamsk, close to Siberia. There he became seriously ill and thought that his life will end. But God was always close to those who suffer. When he ended this prison sentence, he ended up again being arrested and sentenced to 3 more years of prison. Though there were suspicions that this time he would betray the underground church, through fasting, prayer and the support of friends, God gave strength to Alexander Fedorovich to resist and all the designs of the evil one was shattered. He did not betray the brethren working surreptitiously printing Christian literature. After the major political changes brought about by the liberalization period named Perestroika (the liberal-reforms introduced at first by the Soviet president Gorbachev, N. Ed.) and the dismemberment of the Soviet Union, being a construction engineer, he took part in building many houses of prayer. On the early morning of Sunday, June 8, 2008, Alexander Fedorovich went to eternity*. His family wrote, We were deprived of a father, a mentor, of a counselor but the word of God comforts us with the words found in Hebrews 13:7: 'Remember them which have the rule over you, who have spoken unto you the word of God: whose faith follow, considering the end of their conversation.' Amen."

Children Letters Received from the Agape Orphanage



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The Agape orphanage was started in 1993 in the city of Pascani, Romania, by late Reverend Richard Wurmbrand and his wife Sabina. Initially sheltering 56 children. it houses now 36 and is managed by the Christian couple, Carmen and Dorin Gavril. The running expenses of the orphanage when started in 1993 by Reverend and Mrs. Wurmbrand, amounted to about \$25,000 per year. Due to many new requirements of the European Union and galloping inflation, the orphanage needs over \$120,000 per year to function properly. The Romanian government covers some expenses, but due to shortage of funds, the orphanage must rely on local donations of food-packages, cans and containers. Some of its grownup kids have worked in the fields. Some of the children wrote spontaneously moving letters. In order to protect minors, last names are not being disclosed.


From Monica P.: "I was brought (to the orphanage) due the conditions (in our home) but also because my father was beating-up my mother. Mother married another man (than my father.) When six only, I was burnt with heated oil while mother and brothers were fetching water from the fountain in the yard. I tried unplug the electrical heater and that's when the pan fell and the heated oil injured my legs. I am 14 and arrived here (at Agape) in 2012 when only seven. I am in 7th grade. I would like when high school is over, to obtain a designer degree. My siblings are three brothers and two sisters. Two of the brothers (Alex and Şerban) and a sister (Bianca) are also with me (at Agape.) One older brother is living somewhere else, while a sister is with my mother.

Above, a sample only of a long list, our mission was able to compile beside other lists, of over 480 elderly Baptist Christians most of them still alive, who suffered for the Christian faith in the Soviet Union. The former prison sentences amounted from 2 years, to as many as 18 years of communist prison. If considered together, their years of prisonsentences shown in our abbreviated table, would most likely add up to over 2,000 years of prison. The 4^{th} and 5th column together, show year of birth and the most recent country they live in (like Ukraine, Russia, Kazakhstan, Belarus, etc.) We try obtain exact addresses, so we may be able to send encouraging help to those still alive. We were able to send repeated help to about 120 such elderly Russian-speaking Christians and over 110 of other languages. Many of their testimonies you can read in the monthly newsletter.
